August 10, 1956 - February 14, 2025

Gilbert Dean Williams or "Dean" as he was known to family and friends, of Vancouver, WA, passed away February 14, 2025, at Sunnyside Hospital in Clackamas, Oregon, of heart complications stemming from a short battle with cancer. He was 68 years old. Dean was born to James Gilbert and Fern Sasser Williams on August 10, 1956, as one member of a set of twins. Unfortunately, his twin brother James Dale passed away during infancy. He became the youngest of four siblings growing up in the small community of Beaver, Utah. He is remembered as a loving and compassionate brother with a penchant for a little bit of loveable trouble. Dean grew up helping his father in the family's "OK Tire Shop" and helping his mom in "Fern's Floral Shop" while he attended and then graduated from Beaver High School in 1974. Dean would go on to study Radio Broadcasting at Dixie State College where he enjoyed working at the local radio station. From there, Dean became an electrical engineer in the semiconductor industry for 45 years. Dean loved the natural world around him. He loved fishing, camping, cutting firewood, listening to the ocean's continuous surf, rain as it fell, and more. Recently, in his retired life, Dean learned to kayak, and it became a sport of passion. Dean was also a beekeeper. He wore bee shirts to strike up conversations about bees and help educate anyone that would listen. Because Dean grew up in a floral shop, he had an unusual love for flowers. Beekeeping helped complete the tie he had with his past and the way he saw flowers. It was his way of giving back to the world he lived in. Dean loved to travel. He

always wanted to go and see family. He had a strong connection to the ones he loved. His deep love of family was unwavering. Dean married Jaynie Clark on August 12, 1978, which was the beginning of what would be a long and happy marriage of 47 years. Dean and Jaynie began their life together in Salt Lake City, UT then moved to Portland, Oregon, Arlington TX, a short stay in Salt Lake City and then to Vancouver, WA in 1993 for the duration of his life. I'm Dean's wife, Jaynie Williams and would like to thank him for his love. We spent time together as best friends. We loved working together. A good date night was going to the hardware store and getting supplies for our next project. Dean's love for me knew no boundaries. He brought joy to me and his family. When leaving the house, he always said that he loved me and to hurry back home to him. Dean found his true calling when he had the joy of becoming a father in 1981. He would go on to have four children: Troy, Holly, Clay and Maygan. His children grew up knowing unrelenting love, something that was freely given in abundance throughout his life. Dean taught his children how to work, look out for the other guy, be kind, find joy, and follow Christ. When his oldest son, Troy, wanted to raise a pig, Dean was all in. So much so, that for the next 12 years he dedicated his time and resources to helping raise livestock in the FFA program and taking them to the Clark County Fair for market. All four children raised livestock where he taught them how to work beside him. Words that his own children use to describe him are compassionate, faithful, dedicated, integrous, and unconditionally loving. On August 15th, 2009, Dean began his life as a grandfather. He would tell anyone that would listen that this was living. He loved being a grandpa. His grandchildren are Ethan Shannon, Evan Shannon, Lily Williams, McKinley Williams, Ila Williams, Clara (CJ) Ratcliffe and William (Bandon) Ratcliffe VI. Dean could be found at his happiest in the company of his grandchildren who were never in want of his love and affection. Dean was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. He served as Ward Clerk, Scout Master, Cub Scout leader, Sunday School teacher, home teacher and friend. He had a testimony of Jesus Christ. He

always thought it was better to follow in his footsteps than to shout it from the rafters. Dean would go about his day trying to find ways that he could be a follower of Christ by helping others and bring joy to them. Dean is survived by his wife Jaynie, sisters Ila Smith (Val) and Carol Jolley (Bruce), his children, Troy Dean Williams, Holly and Bill Ratcliffe, Clayton and Shirley Williams and Maygan and Matthew Shannon, and seven grandchildren. Family and friends will be celebrating Dean's life with a memorial service on Saturday, March 29th. The service will be held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, 7101 NE 166th Ave., Vancouver, WA at 11:00am. All are welcome to come celebrate his life.
