



## Robert Gerald Stoughton

March 29, 1933 - July 15, 2019

Robert ("Bob") Gerald Stoughton, 86, passed away in his sleep on Monday, July 15, 2019.

Having most recently lived in Vancouver, WA, a resident of Highgate Senior Living, he with his wife (LaVerne) resided in South Albany for 39 years.

In Albany, he worked at the State of Oregon Employment Division. He retired in 1992, having served for 30 years. An avid golfer and a longtime member at Springhill Golf and Country Club, Bob won one club championship, posted a career best 18-hole score of 65, and had four holes-in-one.

Born in Wallace, Nebraska, Bob was raised in Portland, the son of John and Blanche Stoughton. In his early years, he delivered newspapers and attended Parkrose High School where he played on the football, basketball and baseball teams. He played golf at Portland State and then later graduated from the University of Oregon, becoming a loyal Duck fan. He served two years with the Army and worked five years as an Assistant Golf Professional at Colwood Golf Course in Portland. After his retirement, Bob with his wife were avid travelers.

He leaves his wife of 42 years, LaVerne (Moon) Stoughton; his son, Greg Stoughton (Linda); his daughter, Tami Weiss (Trevor Yuro); four step-daughters: Coyla Bedord (Chip); Gayla Miller; Susan Wozniak (Bill) and

Penny Soderholm; his sister (Beth), his brother (Jim) and his brother (Monte).

A viewing was held July 18. A memorial for family will be held, September 15.
