Virginia L. Brooks Robinson, 95, was born Dec. 31, 1915 and passed away July 26, 2011 in Vancouver, WA. Born in Portland, OR, she attended Hosford Grade School and graduated from Franklin High School in 1935. Virginia married Elton Brooks in June 1937 and gave birth to two daughters, Joyce Petersen and Phyllis Corbin of Vancouver, WA. After 53 years of marriage, Elton died in 1990. She also was preceded in death by daughter, Joyce, in 1996. On an Odd Fellow trip to Australia, she became acquainted with Chet Robinson and they married in September 1993. He died on July 8, 2011 just 16 days prior to her death. Virginia was a 64-year member of the Rebekah Assembly of Oregon and all of the branches there in. She belonged to the First Congregational Church for 60 years where she served in many different offices and sang in the choir for 50 years. Virginia is survived by daughter, Phyllis; six grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren; and six great-great-grandchildren.
